View from the Vicarage

Myth or reality? Did Jesus really rise? At the heart of our Easter celebrations this month is the conviction that Jesus Christ rose from the dead on the first Easter morning. But is it true, and what difference does it make?

The New Testament gospels are eyewitness accounts that provide us with historical evidence that Jesus really did rise on that first Easter Sunday. Firstly, they make it clear that Jesus' tomb was empty. All sides involved agreed that his body really



had gone missing. Even Jesus' staunchest opponents had to explain the empty tomb. The second piece of evidence cited by the gospel authors is that the risen Jesus appeared repeatedly to his followers - initially to the women who discovered his empty tomb, and later to his disciples in Jerusalem and Galilee. Fact number three is that these appearances of the risen Jesus totally transformed those who met him. The grief of the women at the tomb turned to joy, while the fear of his first disciples was replaced by faith. As historians such as NT Wright have noted, the Church's emergence and explosive growth is almost impossible to explain unless a momentous, miraculous event inspired and energised its first members.

Confronted by these facts, we can be confident that Christ really rose from the dead. The New Testament texts give us good reason to believe that Jesus is alive. But so what? The answer is that it gives us hope in the face of death. The resurrection of Christ is no mere historical curiosity, rather it is decisive evidence of the ability of God to give human beings life beyond the grave. In the face of bereavement, and confronted with our own mortality, the events of the first Easter morning give us great hope and offer real comfort. 


 Hope Explored explains how Christianity offers us real hope and a joyful expectation for the future, based on true events in the past,

Pause for Thought

"For by one sacrifice he has made perfect for ever those who are being made holy.

Hebrews 10:14

Over the years, I feel that we may have watered down the true meaning of the word 'Sacrifice'. Today, if we give up an hour of tele-watching to go and help a friend, particularly if it is one of our favourite programmes, we may feel that we have made a great sacrifice but that was not how it was defined, or what it must have felt like, two millennia ago.

The practise of sacrificing animals seems very foreign to us now but to a first century Jew, sacrifices not only acted as a sign of repentance, they could actually put your life, and the lives of your family, on the line and acted as a sign that you were putting your trust in God.

Sacrifices weren't just any old animals, they had to be chosen from the best of the best. The prophet Malachi wrote: "When you sacrifice lame or diseased animals, is that not wrong? Try offering them to your governor! Would he be pleased with you? Would he accept you?"

However, even though sacrifices were being made to acknowledge sin and as a sign of repentance, in the Book of Isaiah the LORD says: "I have more than enough of burnt offerings, of rams and the fat of fattened animals; I have no pleasure in the blood of bulls and lambs and goats."" Obviously, God has a preference for true and honest living rather than lives which continually require apologies and requests for forgiveness ... and so God offered his own Son.

Jesus was the ultimate sacrifice made on the cross for all sin and for all time -"He has made perfect for ever those who are being made holy." That is why we celebrate his death and resurrection at Easter — because he is the Saviour of the world and the source of all forgiveness.
